The Harmonium Choir of Reykjavik, Iceland, is a mixed choir, currently with 38 members. The choir has been active since 1991; initially as a choir of employees of Landsvirkjun, the National Power Company, and their family members, friends and associates. Since 2013 the choir has been operated solely by the choir members and at the same time took up the name "Harmonium Choir".

Main public performances are two times every year, i.e. a Christmas concert in December and a spring concert in May. Shorter performances at various occasions and gatherings in Iceland are frequent. The choir has performed several times abroad, three times in Denmark, once in New York, once in Sweden and once in Hungary.

The repertoire has been a mixture of Icelandic and international folksongs but also songs from opera and well-known choir pieces i.e. Schubert's Deutche Messe (2007), Rutter's Mass of the Children (2007), Gounod's Messe Breve (2013) and Haydn's Missa Brevis (2015).

The Choir has also participated in larger projects in cooperation with other choirs; performing Mozart's Requiem (2006), Orf's Carmina Burana in Carnegie Hall in New York (2008), Mozart's Magic flute (2009) and Bragason's Passia of Christ (2017).

During these 25 years the Choir has had four conductors; since 2011 the conductor is Krisztina K. Szklenár.

Krisztina-Kalló Szklenár

Krisztina-Kalló Szklenár is a native of Györ, Hungary. In 1985, she entered the famous Franz Liszt Music Academy in Budapest to study Choral Conducting and Education. She graduated in 1989 with a Master's degree. That same year Krisztina began teaching at the Apáczai Csere János Teaching University in Györ. In 1990 Krisztina and her family moved to Hólmavík, Iceland, where she was an organist at the local church as well as the principal of the music school. In 1993, she moved back to Hungary, where she began teaching again at the University in addition to conducting the Györ City Choir. In 1995 she became an adjunct professor in the music department at the Apáczai Csere János Teaching University. In 1997 Krisztina relocated back to Iceland and became the principal of the Mýrdalshreppur music school, and the organist at the church in Vík. Krisztina has attended numerous courses and workshops, including solo singing. In summer 2002, she received her Cantor's degree at the Theological University of Györ.

From 2002 to present days, she is the Kantor and Director of Music at The Church of Árbær in Reykjavík, Iceland.
